

KEYNOTE PRESENTERS

Justice Edelman, High Court of Australia

Justice Edelman was appointed to the High Court of Australia in January 2017. From 2015 until the time of his appointment he was a judge of the Federal Court of Australia.

From 2011 until 2015 he was a judge of the Supreme Court of Western Australia. He previously practised as a barrister at the chambers of Mr Malcolm McCusker QC in Western Australia from 2001-2011 in the areas of criminal law and commercial law and at One Essex Court Chambers from 2008-2011 in commercial law.


He was a Fellow of Keble College, Oxford from 2005, and Professor of the Law of Obligations at the University of Oxford from 2008 until 2011.



Joanna Bird, Chief Legal Officer, Australian Securities & Investments Commission

Joanna is responsible for ASIC's regulatory work in the credit, retail banking and payments, insurance, financial advice, investment management and superannuation sectors. She has more than 20 years of regulatory experience in financial services, underpinned by experience as a legal academic in financial services law and regulatory theory and practice. Previously, Joanna was the senior executive responsible for regulating Australia's financial advice industry. Under her leadership, the team examined how large institutions supervised their advisers and fees for no service. She also improved the quality of advice

for SMSF owners and retail insurance providers. Her work has helped increase public awareness and led to legislative reform, changes in industry practice and improved enforcement outcomes. Before re-joining ASIC in 2012, Joanna was Associate Professor at Sydney Law School, where she taught financial services law and regulatory theory, and co-authored Everett and McCracken's Banking and Financial Institutions Law. She also worked as a solicitor in banking and finance at Allen Allen & Hemsley (now Allens). Joanna has first-class honours degrees in Civil Law from the University of Oxford and Law from the University of Sydney, where she was awarded the University Medal for Law.



Liam Mason, General Counsel, Financial Markets Authority

Liam advises the FMA executive and board, and leads the enforcement, policy and governance, corporate legal, and investigations teams. He is a key adviser on a broad range of matters relating to the FMA's remit.

Liam has extensive experience in securities and financial services law and corporate governance matters and is well-known and respected across the legal community, the FMA-regulated financial services sector and government departments and agencies. He has held various roles at the FMA, including Acting Chief Executive, Director of Regulation and Director of Governance, Policy and Strategy. He has previously held senior roles at the FMA's predecessor, the Securities Commission.



The Financial Sector (Climate-related Disclosures and Other Matters) Amendment Bill - Implications for NZ Registered Banks and Licensed Fund Managers

The Bill proposes to make New Zealand one of the first countries in the world to make climate-related disclosures mandatory for large financial institutions and listed issuers. Disclosures may be required as early as for financial years ending in 2023. The proposal is that the disclosures will be focused on risk and based on the TCFD framework, but may also include emissions reporting. The External Reporting Board (XRB) is tasked with developing the reporting standards to support the new regime.

This session will examine key features and implications of the Bill currently before Parliament, including the XRB's likely approach to developing the standards under it.


The New Quantum Theory: Statutory Unconscionable Conduct Post-Kobelt

The High Court of Australia's decision in ASIC v Kobelt raised a number of questions for lawyers, including the scope of the statutory prohibition on unconscionable conduct, whether there needs to be a special disadvantage that is exploited and the extent to which the statutory prohibition overlaps with general law unconscionability. This session will examine three recent appellate decisions on statutory unconscionable conduct, consider how the courts have approached these questions and seek to chart a path through the disparate judgments.
