Very exciting news to share for our own **Catherine Robinson**: she has just been awarded the University Doctoral Research Medal from the University of Adelaide for outstanding research at a doctoral level. Her PhD is titled:

A new regulatory framework for insolvency practitioners in Australia: Assessing the effectiveness of the Insolvency Law Reform Act 2016 (Cth) (ILRA)

Catherine's thesis examines the disciplining of insolvency practitioners under the ILRA. It utilises a mixed-methods approach to evaluate how the corporate and personal insolvency regulators, courts, and disciplinary committees have interpreted and applied the law, and whether this gives effect to the policy and legislative objectives of the ILRA.

Congratulations to Academic Committee members who were invited to speak at the Oxford Handbook of Comparative Trust Laws Conference in Vancouver in early April.

The Conference program can be found here: Home | Ohctl Conference (comparative-trusts.ca) and included presentations by the following Academic Committee members: Professor Katy Barnett and Associate Professor Mark Bennett on settlor's reserve powers, Professor Simone Degeling on Trustees' Liability for Illegitimate Gains, Associate Professor Scott Donald on Pension Trusts, D'Angelo (recently appointed Adjunct Professor at UNSW Law) on Commercial Trusts, Associate Professor Matteo Solinas, on Trusts in International Finance and Professor Matteo Solinas, on Trusts in International Finance and Professor Joshua Getzler on History: the Rise of Uses and Trusts in the Pre-Industrial Period.

The papers from the Conference are being refined for inclusion in the *Oxford Handbook of Comparative Trust Laws*, to be published by Oxford University Press in 2025, edited by Richard Nolan (York Law School, UK), Lusina Ho (Hong Kong University), Mark Bennett (Victoria University of Wellington, New Zealand) and Adam Hofri-Winogradow (Allard Law, UBC). Other members from the Academic Committee who were not able to attend the conference are contributing chapters to the book. We will post details when it is available.

Congratulations to members with books recently published:

Dr Anton Didenko:

Didenko A; Jevglevskaja N; Buckley RP, 2024, *Customer Data Sharing Frameworks: Twelve Lessons for the World*, http://dx.doi.org/10.4324/9781003414216. The book's description is as follows:

The proliferation of open banking and open finance regimes across the globe demonstrates an ever-increasing interest of policymakers in empowering customers to take control of their data through innovative data sharing frameworks. These frameworks mostly operate within a single (e.g., financial services) sector but are poised to extend to other parts of the economy in the future - and eventually apply economy-wide. This book articulates the concept of economy-wide customer data sharing (CDS) frameworks, analyses in detail the main challenges associated with the development of such frameworks and is informed by the lessons learned from Australia's world-first cross-sectoral Consumer Data Right regime. It develops a first comprehensive taxonomy of CDS frameworks and offers valuable insights on crucial issues of customer trust, information security, consumer protection and participant regulation. This study, apart from its scholarly importance, has clear practical value. It formulates twelve lessons that will assist governmental officials and other policymakers engaged in establishing and revising data sharing frameworks across the globe. It is essential reading for anyone interested or involved in the law and policy related to the sharing of a most precious resource in the modern economy – customer data.

Associate Professor Sagi Peari:

<u>Rethinking Unjust Enrichment: History, Sociology, Theory & Doctrine</u> (with Professor Warren Swain eds.) (Oxford: Oxford University Press, 2023)

This inter-disciplinary volume brings together scholars from across the globe to challenge the dominant position of unjust enrichment and suggest more satisfactory alternatives.

Rethinking Unjust Enrichment includes a broad range of voices from the UK, US, Australia, Canada, China, Singapore, Germany, Ireland, New Zealand, Hong Kong, and South America. The book includes voices of sceptics who think that the current unjust enrichment doctrine must be seriously qualified and others who think that it should be eliminated altogether.

The contributions cast doubt on the various parameters of unjust enrichment from an analytical standpoint, representing four interrelated perspectives: history, sociology, doctrine, and theory. The four-limb structure of the book provides readers with a clear understanding of the current problems of unjust enrichment at the deepest levels of its history, sociological forces, doctrinal fallacies, and normative deficiencies. This treatment of the subject serves as the basis for a comprehensive reform across jurisdictions.

Comprehensive and multi-faceted, Rethinking Unjust Enrichment is interesting to both sceptics and supporters of the unjust enrichment. It facilitates a critical and constructive dialogue between the two.
